Resident Fellowships

The Mises Institute is now accepting applications for 2010 Summer Fellowships. Summer fellowships named in memory of Peg Rowley are available to graduate students, ABDs, and post-docs interested in scientific research in the Austrian School and classical liberalism.

O.P. Alford III fellowships are available to undergraduates.

These summer fellowships offer a unique opportunity for students to research and write in a particular area of specialization, under the direction of Mises Institute faculty.

Conditions of fellowships vary, and can include accommodations in Auburn, study space, directed research, access to the libraries of the Mises Institute, admission to summer conferences, and a stipend.

In addition to submitting the online form (found at mises.org/events) applications should include three academic letters of recommendation, informal copies of transcripts, a writing sample, and a proposal outlining the research you wish to conduct if granted a fellowship.

Rothbard GRADUATE SEMINAR

June 6–11, 2010 • Auburn, Alabama

The purpose of the Rothbard Graduate Seminar is to provide an intense study of Rothbardian economic analytics. The core text will be Murray N. Rothbard's *Man, Economy, and State with Power and Market*, which each student will receive (additional suggested readings will be posted at Mises.org).

Led by a remarkable faculty, students will participate in a week-long seminar that will take us from the first page to the last. All events will take place at the Mises Institute. Students will also have access to the Mises Institute's library. The seminar begins with dinner at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, June 6 and ends at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, June 11.

Attendance is limited to 20 exceptional students who are pursuing graduate degrees in economics, history, philosophy, political science, and business disciplines who seek a career in academia or research. Applicants must be current graduate students or provide a copy of graduate school acceptance for the fall.

Apply online for a student scholarship at mises.org/web/4777. The application requires informal transcripts, at least one academic letter of recommendation, a writing sample, and a copy of your student ID.

Accepted students receive full tuition, a double-occupancy dorm room, conference meals, transportation between the Atlanta, Georgia airport, and Auburn, Alabama, as well as discounts on books purchased at the Institute.
